BETWEEN FRENCH AND GERMAN.

Renault, Brasler of Banz Picked to Win at Dieppe Today.

DIEPPE, July 6.—On the eve of the great French automobile race, the Grand Prix, which will be run tomorrow, the public choice for winner seems to lie between Renault and Brasler, representing France, and Banz of Germany. The stock of Italian drivers is falling.

Experts are somewhat puzzled by re- ports of almost incredible speed made at the trials, but it is believed if the condi- tions are favorable a new world's record is almost certain.

Guyot, driving a two-cylinder, eigh- teen-horse-power, seventy-eight-bore ma- chine, today won the Grand Prix des Vou- tures. His time was 5:45:30, an aver- age of 80.5 kilometers an hour. Naudin, driving a mono-cylinder, was second, fin- ishing in 5:52:06, and Goux, driving a mono-cylinder machine, was third, his time being 5:56:01.

Guyot led from start to finish. The first three cars to finish were French. The English entry did not start. Neither the Italian nor the other foreign cars were prominent during the race.

A remarkable feature of the race was the stability and regularity maintained by the machines. Although seventeen cars entered for the contest did not start and five did not finish the first lap, thirty-one machines out of forty-seven finished. Accidents were not numerous nor serious. There were two collisions, but the net result was only a single broken arm.

The race was not exciting as Guyot was never headed. Naudin made a gal- lant effort toward the finish when he negotiated his fastest lap in 54:25, at a rate of eighty-five kilometers an hour. The weather was fine and a cool breeze from the sea blew over the course. Over 100,000 people witnessed the race.
