

# HOOSIERS WILL DOT BIG GLIDDEN TOUR

Indiana Autoists Enlist in Long  
Array of Motor Cars for  
Endurance Run.

CAPITOL FURNISHES MANY  
Local Automobile Builders and  
Drivers Expect to Make Good  
Showing During Trip.

Indiana has again pushed itself to the front in automobile ranks by declaring to be well represented in the Glidden tour. The sixth annual endurance run in June, which leaves Detroit en route for Denver, will be dotted with several Hoosier-made and Hoosier-driven cars.

The city of Indianapolis will contribute the largest number of cars and drivers. At present only men affiliated with the motor industry have definitely decided to enter the course, but many others, mostly pleasure seekers, will participate as "lookers on" at various stages of the run.

### Nebraska Invites Gliddenites.

In presenting the American Automobile Association with data calculated to bring about the adoption of a route through Nebraska western automobile men have gathered statistics of the Goldenrod State that can not fail to prove interesting.

From Omaha to Ogalalla, traveling 306 miles of Nebraska road on the way to Denver, the Gliddenites would pass through fifteen cities in which are owned more automobiles than are to be found in any other Western state, with the possible exception of California.

Omaha, with a population of 150,000, has 600 registered automobiles; Lincoln, with 50,000 population, is second in the ownership of motor cars, 450 having been registered. South Omaha has 100; Fremont, 75; Schuyler, with only 2,200 population, has 30 registered cars; Central City, 30; Columbus, 40; Grand Island, 60; Seward, 35; York, 75; Aurora, 60; Kearney, 75; Cozad, 25; North Platte, 30, and Ogalalla, 15.

"If the Glidden is sent through this portion of the country," writes "Pete" Estey, who was one of the Studebaker pathfinders for a route to be submitted to the A. A. A., "every owner of a car, almost without exception, will take some part in the welcome of the Gliddenites. I never saw such enthusiasm among motor car owners as out on the plains roads.

"One of the primary features of the Glidden is to create added interest in automobile manufacturing and marketing. When you consider that less than a decade ago an automobile was absolutely unknown along the buffalo wallow country from Fremont to Ogalalla, it is worth the while of the A. A. A. powers to give conservative consideration to Nebraska's claims for a view of the Gliddenites this year."

The National Automobile Company has announced intentions of entering cars in the Lake County races to be held June 19. George Dickson said that he was positive that some of his cars would participate, but that he is not ready to say what models, nor who the drivers will be.
