CHAIRMAN SEEKS ENTRIES

BUTLER AFTER GLIDDEN CARS

A. A. A. OFFICIAL VISITS SEVERAL INDIANA AUTO MAKERS AND SAYS 1911 TOUR WILL START FROM INDIANAPOLIS.

In the immediate interest of the annual tour of the American Automobile Association for the Glidden trophy, and to confer with contest interests in this city, Chairman Samuel M. Butler, head of the national contest board, stopped in Indianapolis yesterday. Many of the factories throughout the country will be seen by Mr. Butler within the next few days, and those in this city were yesterday the recipients of calls in the campaign for additional contestants for the big national endurance event.

Already Indianapolis heads the list of combined entries with the two Premier touring cars, a Cole and a Parry touring car and a Cole and a Parry runabout, and it is perhaps likely that the Maxwell touring cars will be entered from the local branch. But it is felt that the list of entrants for the Glidden tour should be much larger than the seventeen included in the last official announcement, and this is the reason for the quick-trip of the contest chairman around the factory circuit.

Many Makers Seen.

The officials of the Premier Overland, Empire, American, National, Marmon, Cole and Parry Companies were notified of the stay of Mr. Butler and he was able to personally call upon some of them. Special trips were made to those concerns which have not placed representatives on the entry list, and there is a strong probability that several other machines will compete as a result. It is known that at least four more contesting cars will be added to the seventeen from another city, and altogether there are twenty-six cars to make the start, some, of course, being for the officials or press.

Mr. Butler took lunch with the Flat Tire Club as the guest of H. O. Smith and George A. Weldely of the Premier Company, and there talked with Vice President Hassler of the Empire Company in regard to putting one of this make through the tour. There is regret expressed that the contest will not begin at Indianapolis and thus receive, perhaps, greater support than at present, but it is fairly certain that the Hoosier capital will receive the honor for the 1911 event.
