# CROWD AT LOS ANGELES BY GIVING BATTLER THOROUGH WHIPPING IN TEN ROUNDS.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., July 13.—Ad Wolgast of Milwaukee, despite the fact that he weighed five pounds less than Battling Nelson, gave the durable Dane a thorough whipping in a ten-round bout before the Pacific Athletic Club tonight.

After an even first round Wolgast waded in and had the advantage in six of the remaining nine rounds. The champion did not have a single round in his favor, an even break being the very best he could get.

Wolgast fought the champion at his own game and beat him decisively. Nelson's face was badly swollen and blood streamed from his nose and mouth at the close of the fight. Wolgast was practically unmarked.

It was a terrific fight from the start and it was not until the ninth and tenth rounds that Wolgast succeeded in stopping Nelson's steady rushes. Nelson was a badly worried man in several stages of the fight.

**Round 1**—Nelson met Wolgast in his own corner and followed his usual tactics of advancing steadily to his opponent. Wolgast put a light right to Nelson's face and took a right and left to the face in return. A ripping left reached Nelson's jaw. They exchanged body blows in a clinch and Nelson reached the face with a straight left. Wolgast sent a right cross to the jaw in return. Even round.

**Round 2**—Wolgast reached the head with right and went into a lively mixup in the center of the ring. Wolgast fought viciously, but was backed to the ropes. Nelson fought his way to the center of the ring with body punches. In close quarters Wolgast sent a right and a left to the head. Blood flowed from Nelson's nose. Wolgast sent two right uppercuts to the mouth as the round closed. Wolgast's round by a good margin.

**Round 3**—They went at it hammer and tongs. Wolgast landing right and left to head and body. Wolgast then sent a light left to the face and followed with a hard right to the jaw. Wolgast sent a right swing to the ear, landed right and left to the head and put another left to the body and a right to the face. Wolgast showered Nelson with rights and lefts to the head and Nelson fought back for the stomach. Wolgast landed repeatedly to the face and body. In close quarters Wolgast had all the better of the fighting and had a big lead at the end of the round.

**Round 4**—Both missed right swings, Nelson being first to land, getting a left to the stomach. In close quarters Wolgast sent two swift rights to the face. Nelson's left eye began to swell in this round. They exchanged body punches and Wolgast reached Nelson's head with a left. Nelson

This good running schedule was made despite the fact that the worst roads yet were encountered. The best roads also were met, which evened matters up. The start from Kalamazoo at 7 o'clock was pulled off without a single mishap, all cars being in perfect condition by starting time. Today's route tested the metal of men and motors, as at times the biggest cars were in grave danger of skidding into ditches or being precipitated over high embankments. The riders suffered more today than yesterday. They were tired, sleepless and sore from the initial day's bouncing about.

## Tour Serious Business.

The tour is no longer a novelty; it has settled down to serious business. Even the cordial ever-ready waves and greetings from farmers along the route did not receive as uniform acknowledgment as yesterday. Gliddenites prefer keeping their mouths closed when dust is so thick they can not see twenty feet ahead. "Confetti Lewis," as the trail blazer in his E. M. F. car is called, performed an excellent day's work. He started auspiciously to confirm his assertion at the conclusion of the E. M. F. pathfinding trip last May that he could go every mile of the tour without deviating from his original route by reaching Chicago without leaving the course.

Lewis arrived here forty-five minutes ahead of his schedule. He stated that it was the first time in all his Glidden piloting experience that he has ever accomplished this feat, usually reaching the destination with the first competing car at his tail lamp. He was so enthusiastic over the performance that he has ventured the assertion that he will repeat the same trick daily until the completion of the tour.

The confetti was often covered with dust, causing the tourists to lose their trails, but no serious mistakes resulted. For ten miles out of Kalamazoo the roads were the limit. Then an occasional good stretch would be reached, until South Bend, Ind., was encountered.

## Chicago Reception Party

Chicago did not give the cold shoulder to the Glidden tourists and their hosts as some said. The Chicago Motor Club and the Chicago Automobile Trade Association met at the Glidden hotel to greet the members of both organizations and gave a reception and welcome for the Glidden tourists when they arrived.

The welcoming parade, headed by President F. C. Donald of the Motor Club, and President Thomas J. Hay of the Trade Association, made a run to Jackson Park, where the cars lined up on both side of the road leading from the park into Jeffery avenue.

Frank Martin, chairman of the house committee of the Motor Club, gave a Dutch luncheon and musical entertainment at the new Southern Hotel this evening, but this welcome was small and, as veterans say, sustains Chicago's reputation for indifference. Perhaps because Michigan avenue was packed with automobiles, the Gliddenites attracted only a limited amount of attention. The banquet was a success for those who did without sleep to attend, but the city went on about its business as though there never was a Glidden tour. Concerning Chicago's welcome, one veteran Gliddenite remarked:
