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FINISH RUN IN RAIN HIGHBALL IS BEATEN

TOURISTS REACH COLUMBUS SONOMA GIRL SHOWS SPEED

Citizens of Dayton Give Visitors Hearty Welcome—Premier Cars Running Well.

Great Trotter, Unsteady and Sore, Loses to California Mare in Straight Heats.

COLUMBUS, O., July 17.—The sixth day of the Glidden tour started in rain which continued at intervals during the entire run of 174 miles. After passing Dayton the first thirty cars caught up with the pacemaker and loafed into Columbus, passing through four different showers, the tourists busying themselves in changing from raincoats to dusters and vice versa.

The Stoddard-Dayton furnished each car with luncheon for each passenger and also gave all the gasoline and oil the entrants desired. The citizens of Dayton were more enthusiastic in their welcome than any other city through which the tour has passed. The tourists expressed their appreciation of the courtesy extended them by sending resolutions of thanks to the Stoddard-Dayton factory.

The Columbus Automobile Club is keeping open house for the visitors this evening and doing all in its power to make the evening spent at Columbus long remembered. The run Thursday is to Canton, 154 miles on a time allowance of eight hours and forty-five minutes. Roads are reported to be in fair condition. Barring rain the schedule should be easy.

The Cleveland Automobile Club makes a run to Canton and joins with the Canton Club in an elaborate entertainment for the Glidden visitors.

Farmer Is Hit, Not Badly Hurt.

The run from Indianapolis, aside from the rain, was uneventful, except for one accident. Haynes car No. 54, driven by Ed Noble, struck a farmer by the name of William Herbert, who was holding a frightened horse. The horse threw the man against the fender of Noble's car, breaking a shoulder blade.

Noble took him home and drove ten miles out of his way for a physician and then beat it for Columbus, getting in with a perfect score.

The other Haynes car competing for the Glidden trophy retains its perfect score. The two Premiers, J. W. Moore's, competing for the Glidden trophy and H. O. Smith's for the Howar, are both running well with perfect scores.

LIBERTYVILLE, Ill., July 17.—Three thousand people attended the races at Libertyville today. It was the best racing ever held at the track. The sensation of the day was the winning of the \$5,000 stake for 2:20 trotters by Sonoma Girl. Five starters faced the wire and got the word the first time. Sadie Fogg led the bunch to the half in 1:06½, where she was overtaken by Highball and Sonoma Girl; they worked on even terms to the distance pole, where Springer called on Sonoma Girl for more speed. She responded cheerfully, finishing a half length in the lead.

Geers was not able to meet the terrific brush of the California mare. The last half was trotted in a minute and the last quarter in twenty-nine seconds. Margaret O and Tolling Chimes were distanced. In the second heat the clip from the wire was too fast for Highball. He left his feet and was only able to save his distance, Sadie Fogg securing second position.

Highball acted badly, scoring in the third heat and broke again after leaving the wire, but with a sensational burst of speed landed in second position. It was plainly evident that the clip set by Sonoma Girl was too fast for the Son of Dr. Hooker.

C. L. De Rider won the 2:12 trot in straight heats with Athasham, but not without an argument in each. Baraja was second in the first and third heats, securing second money, third going to Icelandier. Summaries:
