MARMON TEAM OUT

IS PENALIZED TEN POINTS

**PROTEST IS LODGED WITH CHAIRMAN
HOWER BECAUSE OF ENFORCED
DELAY, BUT IT IS
DENIED.**

RANGELEY, Me., July 21.—One of the Indianapolis trio of Marmon cars contesting for the Glidden trophy was penalized today and it now seems that the assessment of ten points will stand notwithstanding a protest which was made to Chairman Hower by W. C. Marmon of the Nordyke & Marmon Company.

William Clark, driver of the penalized car, with several others, caught up with the pacemakers' car, which no contestant is allowed to pass, about seventy-five miles out. The despotic little chairman, riding in this car, ordered his driver to lessen speed and as a result those who were trailing his machine were soon from ten to fifteen minutes behind their schedule.

When nearing Rangeley the brake on Clark's car creased and it was necessary for him to relieve the car wheels before the brake could be loosened. This took so much time that the car reached this control ten minutes late, for which a ten-point penalty was assessed.

Chairman Hower refused to listen to Mr. Marmon's protest, which he should have done, having ordered the speed. Because of this fact the Marmon could not make up all its time. This leaves only three teams now tied for the Glidden trophy with five runabouts still tied for the Hower shield. Hower is being freely criticised tonight for his action in regard to the Marmon protest.

The roads from Poland Springs to Rangeley Lake were in poor condition and the contestants had little time to spare on the road. The ever-shifting sand and the heavy clay made the going bad and the drivers exercised great caution. There are only two more days of running before Saratoga is reached and these days may be the hardest of the entire 1,700-mile trip.

The run to Bethlehem, N. Y., tomorrow is over a hard clay road that will be almost impassable in rain. Six hours and forty minutes is the time scheduled for the trip.
