NEW YORK, July 24.—The fourth annual Glidden Cup tour of the American Automobile Association, aggregating 1,600 miles from Cleveland, O., to the Atlantic coast cities by way of Chicago, and covered in twelve days, was completed this morning with the run from Philadelphia to Jersey City, ninety-six miles, which was covered in five and one-half hours. The entire party arrived at Jersey City at 12:30 today and crossed over to Manhattan at Twenty-third street. The members lined up on Twenty-third street, near the ferry, until all were over and then started to Broadway and Fifty-ninth street, where in Columbus Circle the tour was officially declared ended.

Although several women started bravely from Cleveland, the only one to finish is Mrs. Andrew Cuneo. She endured the hardships of mountain travel and never flinched when confronted with the difficulties of the road which drove other women to give up the trip.

Tourists Make Picturesque Sight.

Dressed principally in khaki suits and seated in begrimed machines the tourists made a picturesque sight as they went up Broadway. Piled on the cars were bags and bundles, traveling kits and souvenirs of the trip, making an almost paradoxical combination of fixtures of the emigrant wagon of the West and a gasoline motor.

BRAZIL, Ind., July 24.—With less than \$100 in the box office Willie Fitzgerald of Brooklyn and Paddy Lavin of Buffalo refused to enter the ring for the ten-round bout scheduled at the Coliseum tonight. The men withheld their decision until after two fast preliminaries which wound up in the arrest of all the principals and Manager Harry Johnson.

While the fight fans believed they were handed a lemon in the recent Donovan-Walcott bout the promoters certainly got theirs tonight. The expected crowd from Terre Haute did not show up, and the Brazil fight fans showed little enthusiasm. The determined stand of Sheriff Prince also is believed to have caused a slump in the attendance.

The preliminaries were spirited. The first bout was between Andy Howell of this city and Bob Long of Indianapolis. The boys went six fast rounds with honors even when Sheriff Prince stopped the match and placed both under arrest.

Kid Kahn of Terre Haute and Kid Lucca of Spring Valley, Ill., came next. The Terre Haute lad made a remarkable showing, and had an even break until the sixth round, when Lucca took a spurt and had Kahn going.

Sheriff Prince stepped in again and placed Lucca and Kahn under arrest. Manager Johnson gave bond for all, and the cases will be tried in the morning. It is the intention of the fight promoters to make a test of the law.

When the time came for the big bout, Fitzgerald and Lavin announced that there was nothing doing, owing to the slim attendance. The windup tonight is a severe jolt to the fight game here and it may take several months for the game to recover.

The Premier touring car was the only Indianapolis car that finished the trip with a perfect score. The Premier Automobile Company entered a runabout to compete for the Hower trophy, which, after reaching Pittsburg with a perfect score, was withdrawn when Harry Hammond, the pilot, was taken sick. Both cars finished in great shape and proved the equal of any of the machines in the run.
