

# GLIDE AUTO LOSES GLIDDEN TOUR TRAIL

Fails to Report at Denver by  
Midnight, After All Others  
Arrive.

## ROADS CAUSE SUFFERING

Worse Route of Trip Is Traveled  
Over Miserable Highways  
to Short Rest.

DENVER, Col., July 24.—(Special)—Until today the 154.4 miles of rock and gumbo roads between Madison and La Crosse, Wis., were called the worst which the Glidden tourists had ever traveled. However, the 206 miles negotiated today over unblazed prairie trails, through running streams and over the foothills of the Rockies to this city were the worst yet encountered of any American automobile tour.

Despite these terrible conditions, only one car was penalized, although dozens of cars were pushed and pulled out of sand, mud and water. For miles no living thing was seen, and not even a shed had been erected on the sunburned prairie.

The car penalized was Thomas No. 11. This was for repairing a broken gasoline feed pipe. After leaving Julesburg the cars encountered fair roads for thirty miles.

When a twisting trail over rotten bridges was encountered all cars fell behind schedule. Next came good going for twenty miles when 100 miles of prairie was encountered. Across this vast ex-

#### Fire Stops Pilot.

An engine spark having set fire to the E. M. F. confetti car destroyed the only means the pilot had of blazing the way. For seventy-five miles the tourists steered about the prairie by dead reckoning, making many detours by losing the way.

Grades of all degrees were encountered. This was the most desolate part of the trip. Even the ambitious homeseeker lacked the temerity to attempt to build even a shed upon this sterile soil. The only living thing encountered for fifty miles, was the inhabitants of a prairie dog village. A dozen punctures were caused by contact with cactus. Upon their arrival here tonight, tired, sick and sore of muscle, the tourists were piloted to the home of the Denver Motor Club, where an hour's rest was enjoyed while refreshments were served. Several of the tourists were taken ill as a result of drinking the alkali water of the prairie.

#### Glide Is Lost.

The Glide car is lost somewhere on the prairie and had not been heard from at midnight. The Thomas press car, among seven to cross a rotten bridge seventy miles out of Denver in single file, broke through the bridge and, with its occupants, was precipitated six feet into an irrigating ditch, and, with the assistance of a block and tackle and the combined muscles of a dozen newspaper men, climbed the bank covered with mud.

The Denver Motor Club has planned an elaborate trip for Sunday and Monday, including banquets and trips to the mountains. The clubhouse has been thrown open to the tourists. On Tuesday the tourists start on the way to Hugo, Colo. The distance is but 173.5 miles. The going is reported better and the towns closer together.
