In the first real test of the sixth annual American Automobile Association from Madison to this city yesterday, the competing cars were given enough strains to be seriously penalized later on. A forest fire was started by one of the cars and extinguished by the volunteer fire fighters from the Studebaker and the Chalmers-Detroit press cars, and subsequently this Studebaker car was ditched by mechanic Frank Schultz, who was relieving driver George Smithson at the Driver Charles Goldthwaite, of the Maxwell runabout No. 107 and his observer were hurled from their seats at the first big bad hill near Kendali, when the machine struck a water break in a narrow road.
