**LEAVE MINNEAPOLIS FOR MAN-
KATO, 132 MILES.**

WEEK OF HARDSHIPS AHEAD

MINNEAPOLIS, July 19.—D. F. Lewis, Glidden tour pathfinder, left Minneapolis at 6 o'clock this morning on the second stage of the 1909 tour, followed at 7:30 by Chairman Frank B. Hower. The first of the contesting cars was away at 8 o'clock, followed at intervals of one minute by the other contestants.

The run to Mankato, today's schedule, is 132 miles, and Lewis said that he expected to make the distance in six hours and a half.

The running time today was announced 6 hours and 36 minutes, which should prove an easy day's trip, following the long runs of Thursday and Friday. The roads are said to be in fair shape, with the exception of the last forty miles or so, where the dreaded gumba may be encountered in case of rain.

From Mankato the tour proceeds through Ft. Dodge, Council Bluffs, Kearney and Julesburg to Denver, which will be the last long rest the tourists will have until the finish of the trip at Kansas City, July 30.

Three nights and two days will be spent in Denver, where the Colorado city residents are preparing to out do Detroit and Minneapolis in the way of entertainment, if possible.

That this week will prove a hard strain on both cars and drivers is unquestioned. Three days of the trip to Denver will require the cars to travel over two hundred miles a day over roads which have never been noted for perfection. From Ft. Dodge on the Gliddenites will use Pullman sleepers in place of hotels, where adequate accommodations could not be obtained.
