## **GLIDDEN** TOURISTS ARRIVE IN TOLEDO

Every Car but One Makes Perfect Score, Detroit Club Being Only Entry to Suffer,

INDIANA AUTOS SHOW WELL

Premier, Official Pilot, Makes First Leg of Journey in About Six Hours.

TOLEDO, O., July 10.-Forty-eight contestants in the American Automobile Association's annual tour for the Glidden and Hower trophies, the feature event of the automobile year, wound their ways into Toledo late this afternoon after a stormy trip from Cleveland, having completed the first leg of the tour which will take them over 1,500 miles.

Every car but one made a perfect score and the Detroit club' was the only one

which drew a penalty.

"Thank goodness, we are about through the Ohio roads and will get on the Indiana highways soon," is the way the drivers are expressing themselves tonight. They are unanimous in the .opinion that no state in the Union has better roads than Indiana and every one looks forward with considerable pleasure to the trip from Chicago and back to Indianapolis, which will be reached next Tuesday night.

Today's journey of 121 miles was about as perilous a one as could happen. The roads are in miserable shape nearly all the way, but very few of the cars took over six hours to make the trip. One of the Welch cars entered by the Detroit Auto Club, in trying to avoid running over a boy, smashed into the side of a bridge and was badly damaged, picking up a penalty. Although the others came through nicely it is the general opinion that there will be very few perfect scores by the time Indianapolis is reached.

There was very little fast running done. Most of the cars set out at a twenty-milean-hour gait and kept it up all the way, two or three had trouble, but the delays, considering the bad condition of the roads, were trifling.

The Apperson Company is well represented, and one of its cars was one of the first to be checked of this morning. Several of the big Hoories manufacturers that were represented last year did not send contestants this year.

One of the noteworthy things about the tour is the friendliness of the farmers along the route. Without an exception they came out only to cheer, and every car was compelled to answer a greeting from the farm houses that were passed.

MAKES EUCLID COURSE IN 71

Famous Golfer Captures Medal for Low Qualifying Score With 146 at Cleveland.

CLEVELAND, O., July 10.—Thirty-three contestants for the national amateur golf championship today finished their qualifying rounds with scores of 166 or better. Nothing could show the high class of the field that is entered for this year's championship better than these scores, the high figure being four strokes better than that of a year ago at Englewood, N. J., when 169 qualified.

The Euclid course, over which this year's championship is to be decided, is regarded by most experts as being two strokes easier than the New Jersey course, so this shows a good margin in favor of the field that is entered this year.
