Previous records on the famous fourcornered track were shattered yesterday-by Barney Oldfield and Ollle Savin. Oldfield's best record in the Green Dragon was a mile in 59 4-5 seconds, which is 5 1-5 seconds better than the time made in 1904 by Jed Newkirk in his famous car "992." Savin circled the track with his pow-

erful Red Devil in 1:02 2-5. Yesterday was an ideal one for an automobile meet. The sun was warm enough to make things pleasant, and yet there was not the oppressive heat of midsummer. The rains of last week had settled the dust of the track and thus eliminated what might have been a disagrecable feature.
