Cornell Runs Away With the Track Honors

PHILADELPHIA, Pa.—Cornell did the expected this afternoon when Jack Mankley's athletes easily ran away with the forty-second annual championships of the I. C. A. A. A. on Franklin field. They came from behind Pittsburg, Dartmouth and Princeton late in the meet and garnered twelve of the 15 points in the two mile run and ten in the broad jump. Pittsburg, with only seven men qualified in yesterday's trials, was second with 30 points while Dartmouth and Princeton came next with twenty-six and 19 respectively. The remaining totals were:

Pennsylvania 18; Massachusetts Institute of Technology 13; Columbia 12; Penn State, Lafayette and John Hopkins five; Amherst 3 1/2; Brown and Yale three; Rutgers 2 1/2; Harvard two and Swarthmore one.
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All performances were mediocre. The only approach to a record was Shea's sprint in the 440, which over a heavy track brought the Pittsburg star to the tape in 47.3-5. Erdman, the Princeton hurdler, narrowly escaped defeat in the 120 high hurdles just nosing out Smith of Cornell. He easily won the 220 hurdles in 24.2-5 seconds, three Cornell runners finishing next in order. Bresser, of Cornell, leaped the two mile field in winning the 9 minutes run in the slow time of 9 minutes 42.2-5 seconds. Jack finished second, Spear fourth and Selbach fifth, giving Cornell all but one place. Ganzemuller, of Penn State, won the 100 yard dash in 10.1-5 second, while Haymond of Pennsylvania finished first in the furlong in 21.3-5. Shaw of Columbia, won the half mile in 56.4-5 seconds.

Less than a thousand spectators attended the meet.

Harvard Defeats Yale In Annual Boat Race Evnet

DERBY, Conn.—Harvard's varsity defeated Yale in the annual boat race on the Housatonic river this afternoon for a race between the two big schools. No observation trains were run and the highway running along the river bank is so narrow as to forbid the passing of carriages. The course was used for the first time, altho it had been selected two years ago. It was found to be ideal, with the exception of a slight curve which made one course six inches longer than the other. Yale took the outside course.

Tom Milton Wins 100 Mile Harkness Auto Derby Race

SHEEPSHEAD BAY SPEEDWAY, N. Y.—Tom Milton, driving a Duesenberg, won the 100 mile Harkness trophy race on the wooden speedway here this afternoon. His time was 53 minutes, 31 seconds.

Barney Oldfield, dean of American drivers, sent his "Golden Submarine" across the finish line in second place. Ira Vail, in a Hudson, was third, and Ralph De Palma, driving a Packard, finished fourth. Dario Resta, who started in his famous Resta Special, quit the track at the end of the twen-

tieth lap when his mount burst into flames. Louis Chevrolet, star of last year's curtailed races, started at scratch, but he finished last, owing to much tire trouble throught the race. Fifty thousand persons were on hand to witness the event, despite the fact that only a short distance away at Belmont Park some of the year's best horse races, were being run.

The track was fairly fast and in good condition, despite the recent rains.
