

Instead of having the recharging plugs attached to the ends of long wires, which are dragged about the floor from car to car, these wires are all placed in insulated conduits under the floor in the Anderson garage. the iffersections of regularly spaced squares, handholes with flat from covers are provided; from these the recharging plugs, attached to short wires, are drawn when needed, automatically slipping back when not in use. The advantages of this plan are that a car can be conveniently recharged wherever it stands on the garage floor, and the floor is at alletimes kept clear of a tangle of long wired.

When Detroit women take their cars to the Anderson garage to be recharged they go out on the floor to see how it is done, knowing they can do so without danger of soiling their gowns.
