MANUAL TRACK MEN AT WORK.

Coch Siler Starts Practice With State High School Meet in View.

Track work is on in earnest at Manual Training High School. Coach Siler has a squad of thirty clad track artists in training on the field west of the river and bordering on Kentucky avenue. The men have their hearts set on winning the state high school meet to be held in Bloomington in May. This is the only branch of interscholastic athletics left to the two local high schools, and the boys are turning their best efforts in that direction.

Coach Siler gave the runners a talk yesterday that put ginger into them and made every athlete work harder during the entire afternoon. He has a likely bunch to pick from, but he is urging more boys to come out and try. The men who are showing up best are Ankenbroch, Stackhouse and Kater in the sprints; Kraute and Parker in the 440; Stiltz and Fatout in the half; Stanton and Stuart in the mile; Stackhouse, Fatout and Berger in the pole vault; Fatout and Knowlton in the high jump. Siler is looking for weight men, as no first-class weight tossers have put in an appearance.

SOUTH BEND, Ind., April 15.—Pitcher Fred Smith, purchased by the South Bend Central League team from St. Paul, and Catcher Watson drafted from the Wisconsin League, reported for duty today and will join the team at Bloomington, Ill., tomorrow.

Much Interest Taken in Endurance Contest Which Is to Be Held May 20.

At a meeting of the Indianapolis Automobile Trade Association last night at the Denison, recommendations of the directors for a sealed bonnet endurance run to be held on May 20, were adopted. The contest will be between 140 and 150 miles long over a triangular course, the legs to be as near equal as possible and Indianapolis to be one of the points of control.

Cars made in this city will have no advantage over the machines entered by out-of-town manufacturers. Observers will be placed on each car and these men will make out reports stating exactly and minutely what was done to each machine during the run and these reports will be delivered to a technical committee consisting of George A. Wideley of the Premier Company; H. O. Wall of the National Company and Howard Marmon of the Nordyke-Marmon Company.

This committee will draw up the rules which will govern the contest. It will at the completion of the event turn over its report to the judges—H. H. Rice of the Pope-Toledo Company; Louis Wainwright of the Diamond Chain Company and E. H. Hibberd, a private owner. The judges will determine the winner from the statistics at hand.

Believes Plan Is Good.

The association believes that it has evolved a plan which will put all contestants on equal ground and which will prevent any argument and will justly determine the merits of each machine. The entries will be divided into three classes, according to a price basis, and will be run in general under the A. A. A. rules.

It was suggested last night that a team race be run in connection with the sealed bonnet contest for the trophy cup offered by The Star. Each company is to enter three cars and the best high average to win the cup. However, this was not adopted.

It will come up at the next meeting of the board of directors, which will be held next Wednesday night at the Capital Auto Company. The next general meeting of the association will be held on Saturday week at the Denison.

A large number of members was present last night and the interest that was shown in the proposed contest promises to make it an event long to be remembered in the annals of the local automobile world.

YOUNG OF CHICAGO HIGH-AMATEUR

Leads in First Day's Spring Tournay Score of 185

BAD WEATHER HURT

Barkley Takes Honors Professionals—Even Today.

Jesse Young of Chicago leads the first day's shoot of the Gun Club's annual spring with a total of 185 birds to a possible 200. Lee Barkley of Chicago, was high professional, shattering 192 targets. Ed Evansville took second among the amateurs, while Le Comond placed in the professional.

The weather was miserable, the scores down, but it was a fine day for the Gun Club. The shooters were there to the time, and they had it, too. The rival firms walk a fine line, a minute a man left the trap in danger, as the practice was ever present.

The struggle was an intense one from the opening of the morning, as every contestant was in the ring for ten or fifteen innings, and it was not until the afternoon that the "squad" had finished firing the trap and prize money were declared.

Honors to Visitors

The visitors carried away a share of the purses. Gunderman of Wisconsin was third high with a score of 185. Tom Marshall, who won the Michigan Handicap in 1899 and is one of the most familiar figures in the shooting world, was relegated to fourth place in the standing of the day. Horace Helkes, son of R. H. Helkes of Dayton, winner of the Grand Handicap in 1900, was nose and tail behind by one bird.

Young Helkes is a chip off the old block. In the last try he shattered the record without a miss, but Marshall was too big to overcome.

Tom Parry was high among the amateurs landing fifth with a score of 185. Chamberlin of Columbus, Ohio, won by the margin of two targets. Jim Bell of St. Louis, a member of the Indianapolis Gun Club, man of the spring shoot to win yesterday and had the title of Mayor Ed Voris of Crawfordsville.
