

# Autos Sealed Bonnet Endurance Run Starts This Morning Am

## THIRTY-SEVEN CARS TO GO IN CONTEST

Automobile Endurance Run to Start From University Square This Morning.

ROUTE 150 MILES IN LENGTH

Machines to Pass Through Noblesville, Anderson, Muncie and Newcastle.

The big automobile sealed bonnet endurance contest will be on this morning when the thirty-seven cars, representing as many different combinations of mechanism and power, start from University Square on the severe run through Noblesville, Anderson, Muncie and return by way of Newcastle to Indianapolis. At 1 o'clock yesterday afternoon the entered cars were turned over to the contest committee, and after a rigid examination of the condition of the machines they were covered and placed under watch on the Meridian street side of the downtown park.

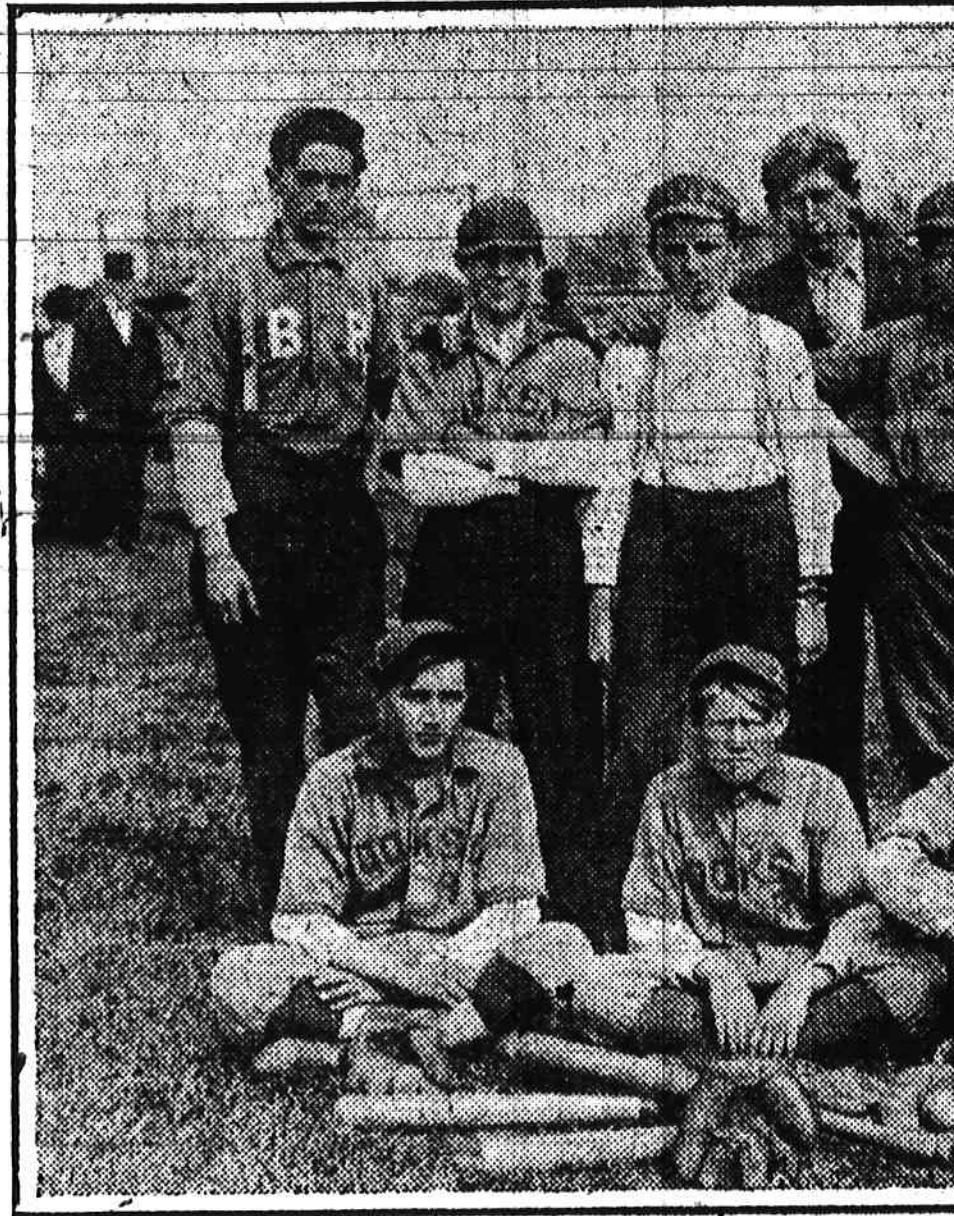
The first evidence of the contest that people along the route will get will be the appearance of the confetti cars. Frank Moore and A. E. Vinton will hit the trail about 6 o'clock and will blaze the way in a big Premier car. Some time later Paul Smith and P. D. Stubbs will take another load of confetti in a National, to be ready in case the first car meets with any mishap.

The endurance run will be one literally in the strictest sense of the title. Every kind of road—good, bad, fair, hilly, muddy, rough, smooth—will be encountered in the struggle. It will be impossible to do anything with the mechanism during the strenuous route, as observers will ride in each car to see that the machines remain sealed from start to finish.

### Cars Leave Every Minute.

The cars will leave University Square one minute apart and are scheduled to arrive at intervals of one minute about 3 o'clock this afternoon. It will not be necessary to exceed the speed limit at any time during the course.

The contestants are divided into three classes. Class A cars are called upon to make a speed of eighteen miles an hour, Class B sixteen miles and Class C fourteen miles an hour. Class A machines will leave the starting point followed by Class B cars, and the Class C autos will come last.

A press car has been provided by the Indianapolis Automobile Company. It is a big Rapid bus and will bring up the rear of the official procession, while trailing behind will be a number of people who want to take the trip for pleasure.

### Committee in Marmon Car.

The technical committee, composed of Frank Staley, chairman; George Wideley and W. H. Wall, will ride in a big Marmon car, driven by Howard Marmon. This car will be one of the last to start and has the duty of passing all other contestants and finishing first.

The observers in each car immediately upon the arrival of the machine in which they are in, will deliver a minute report of the machine to the contest committee, which will take action on these statements and declare the winner, after personally examining the mechanism of the cars.

The run is the biggest ever held in this city and is expected to do much for auto-mobiling. It is but one of many events to be held by the Indianapolis Automobile Trade Association this season.
