WILL RUN 1,000 MILES ON NEW MOTOR RACE TRACK

National Car Plans Ten-Day Feat, Constant Running After World's Record.

The National Motor Vehicle Company has started out after a record which if accomplished will be well calculated to stagger motordom. This is nothing less than 1,000 miles a day for ten days in a National stock car on a circular track.

The new motor speedway now under construction northwest of Indianapolis will be completed in May or June. It will be a two-mile track with easy turns properly banked, with a winding track within covering five miles. The National Company has closed a lease on the track for ten days as soon as it is completed and will go out after the record.

The trial will be made with a single car and will be under official observation. The grind will go night and day for 240 hours, with tire repairs or repairs of any kind to be made in running time. That is, the time thus lost will not be credited to the car.

The National people feel fairly confident of reaching the record of 10,000 miles in ten days, since some years ago they made a world's record of 1,094 3-16 miles in twenty-four hours.
