A. A. A. Contest Board Rules Out Stock Cars

After inspection of the stock cars entered in the Motor Speedway races the contest board of the A. A. A. issued the following statement:

"The following cars having been declared as contestants in the three-day event on the Indianapolis Motor Speedway, to be held May 27, 28 and 30, and being ineligible to compete in the various "stock car" events are hereby debarred from such competition in such events, viz: Buick, Model 16A, Model 16B, Model 100; Jackson, Model 30; Cutting, Model 50; Westcott, Model F; American, Speedster; Fuller, 1911 Roadster; Empire, 1911 Model C.

"The foregoing cars were debarred from competition in the 'stock car' events because of the insufficiency of number manufactured as required by the 1910 rules of the contest board of the American Automobile Association, which provide that in no event shall the required number of the model entered be less than twenty-five."

This does not bar the cars from the free-for-all events or the big trophy races, not for stock cars.
