NEW YORK, Feb. 8.—Announcement
was made today by the Aero Club of
America that it had decided to hold its
first grand prize race at Indianapolis on
June 5 next. It will have the co-opera-
tion in the work of preparations for the
event and its management of the aero
club's affiliated with the national body in
various parts of the country.

The race will be open to pilots regis-
tered with the Aero Club, the prize to
be a gold cup of a value not exceeding
\$1,000, with an entry fee of \$25, to be
refunded to actual starters. The entries
will close at noon on May 1.

The Aero Club of Indiana will have im-
mediate supervision of the race, which
will be started from the Indiana Motor
Parkway grounds. The entries are lim-
ited to balloons of 77,000 cubic feet ca-
pacity, with a 5 per cent allowance. The
rules of the International Aeronautic Fed-
eration will prevail.

the Indiana Aero Club was to begin prepa-
rations for the event immediately.

The balloons will start from the Indiana
Motor Parkway grounds, the new auto-
speedway under construction west of the
city, on the Crawfordsville road. A pipe
line is being laid from the plant of the
Indianapolis Gas Company to the grounds
and arrangements, contingent on the
holding of the meet here, had been made
with the Gas Company several weeks ago
for a special run of gas.

There will be probably fifteen or twenty
entries in the race. There are as many
clubs affiliated with the American Aero
Club, and each is expected to furnish a
pilot. Fisher, Dr. Goethe Link and R. E.
Irvin are the Indianapolis men who ex-
pect to qualify as pilots and enter the
race. Fisher and Burnbaugh will enter
together sailing in a new balloon with a
capacity for 50,000 cubic feet of gas, which
Burnbaugh is making.
