A crowd gathered in the large committee room and cheered lustily at every report showing Holtzman in the lead.

The popularity of various candidates for the nomination for mayor among their immediate neighbors is shown by the unofficial returns from their home precincts. The returns from the Fourth Precinct of the Eighth Ward are especially interesting, as that is the home of Joseph E. Bell and John W. Holtzman. The figures show that W. D. Headrick and Thomas S. Meeker both lost their precincts.

The Second of the Fourth Ward, by a big majority. He received 91 votes, while Uhl, his closest opponent, received only 27. John W. Holtzman in that precinct got 85 votes and Bell got 43. Johnson and Stewart split even with 40 votes each.

Thomas S. Meeker lost his own precinct, the Second of the Second Ward. He was the low man there, Keegan outrunning him by eight votes. Bell carried the precinct, receiving 82 votes, with Holtzman second with 43 votes.

W. D. Headrick, like Meeker, in his precinct, was the low man of the three Progressives in that precinct.
