Few, if any, Indianapolis automobile enthusiasts have ever seen a gold-plated auto, but they will have the opportunity during the next few weeks. The Overland Automobile Company, of this city, is now building a Model 38, 1910 roadster that will be finished with gold plate and that will be awarded to the driver making the fastest mile on the new Indianapolis motor speedway during 1909. The car will be placed on exhibition in this city during the next few weeks and it is expected to attract a lot of attention.

All of the fixtures that ordinarily would be of brass will be of gold. It is not known what the car will cost as it has not yet been determined how much gold plate will be needed. The car will be painted white and gold. Three automobile race meetings have already been planned for the new speedway for this year, the first of which will be held Thursday, Friday and Saturday, August 19, 20 and 21. The second meeting will be on Friday and Saturday, September 24 and 25, and the feature will be a twenty-four-hour race. The third and last meeting of the year will be held in October. The gold car, as it will be known, will not be awarded until all of the meetings have been held. At each meeting attempts will be made to break all short-distance records.

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Holders of Records.

The mile record for circular tracks over one mile in length is :46 1-5 and it is held by Webb Jay, now the Chicago agent for the Premier company. It was made over the Morris racetrack in New York. The mile record for a mile circular track is :51 flat and it is held by De Palma. Marriott, with a Stanley steamer, holds the mile record for a straight course. It is :23 2-5 and it was made on the Florida beach.

The mile record on circular tracks over one mile in length is expected to be shattered in Indianapolis before the year expires and the driver who lowers it the most will be awarded the gold car.

Nationals Enter First.

Four Nationals were the first cars entered in the races that are to open the big motor speedway next month. A. C. Newby, president of the National Automobile Company, has already named four of his cars in two contests. Two of them will compete for the Prest-O-Lite trophy, for cars of Class 2 from 301 to 450 cubic inches piston displacement, weighing over 2,100 pounds. The other two will race for the Wheeler-Schebler trophy for cars of piston displacement of six hundred cubic inches or less, and weighing not less than 2,400 pounds. Oldfield and Alken will probably drive the Nationals. Oldfield's Old Glory is eligible for one of the races.
