There is a siding capable of holding fifteen cars at the ground and others are brought out as fast as these fifteen cars can be emptied. Forty carloads of pitch was the first order for the track and more will have to be bought before the track is completed. The pitch or taroid is put on two gallons to the square yard.

The crushed stone is being bought of eighteen different firms over the country, as one firm could not supply it fast enough. Three sizes of stone are used in constructing the track. Work on the different stands, repair pits and sub-bases is going on rapidly and all will be in readiness when the first events on the track are scheduled during the motorcycle meet August 13 and 14.
