The speedway is constructed upon a large scale and will attract immense crowds of people. Without the sale of intoxicants it is attractive and safe for all classes of people interested in clean sport. To open a saloon either with- in or immediately without the gates would be to degrade the place in the estima- tion of thousands.

Saloons are excluded from our state fair ground and from county fair grounds. They are not permitted in our baseball parks and justly so. Intoxicating liquors must be abstained from by ath- letes who would produce the best re- sults; they destroy the power of endur- ance and give only an inflated exhillira- tion that is of no value to the contestants. The use of liquors breeds fighting and lawlessness and fosters rowdyism and where the elements of chance enter so largely into the contest of the games and where interested spectators add to the ex- citement of the contests the inflaming influence of liquor much evil is wrought.

As the speedway will be of national and international interest we sincerely hope the promoters will refuse to allow the sale of liquors on the grounds and that if the matter comes before the county commissioners they will promptly refuse license to any person for such sale either within or without the grounds.
