SPEEDWAY WILL PLEASE AUTOISTS SAY OFFICIALS

BIG COURSE EXPECTED TO BE IN FINE SHAPE THURSDAY.

Officials of the new motor speedway stated today that there will be no complaints against the track next Thursday when the first automobile races are scheduled to be held there. According to their statement the big force of workmen that will be kept busy day and night until time to start the races, will have the track in lightning fast shape. The autoists will begin to practice in earnest on the course as soon as the motorcycle races are concluded Monday.

Four additional entries have been officially made, including Ralph De Palma, with his big Fiat, and three additional Marions, of Indianapolis. The total number of entries now is sixty-one. Walter Christie, who will drive his Christie, arrived last night. The Buick drivers and mechanicians, thirty in all, with fifteen cars, will arrive Monday. The motorcycle events, which will be under the management of the American Federation of Motorcyclists, will be run off on Friday, September 10, and the motor boat races, with the national Marathon run, will take place on Thursday, the 9th.
