The management of the Indianapolis motor speedway has announced that five automobile racing meets and one aviation meet will be held at the speedway next year. Charles Sedwick, Indiana representative of the American Automobile Association, has submitted dates to the racing board for approval. Three holiday dates are included in the list—Memorial day, Fourth of July and Labor day.

According to present plans, the first meeting will be held in May, beginning on Friday, May 27, and continuing Saturday and Monday, the latter being Memorial day. The second meeting is scheduled for July 1, 2 and 4, with a combination automobile and balloon race program. Dirigible balloon contests will be held in addition to automobile races against records for distance and endurance.

July is also the month selected for the proposed international aviation contests. On July 23 it is planned to have aviators from foreign countries enter into competition with American aviators, the carnival to be held under the rules of the Aero Club of America. Among the machines that will likely be entered are two already in the aerodrome at the speedway, a Farman biplane, owned by J. W. Curzon, and a machine built by Curzon himself since coming to Indianapolis. A. F. Warner, of Beloit, Wis., is expected to add his Curtiss machine to the speedway collection within the next few weeks. Carl G. Fisher, president of the speedway company, may also have a monoplane and biplane ready for the meet.

Twenty-Four-Hour Race in August.

During the month of August, it is planned to put on the twenty-four-hour race, which was postponed last summer. The dates selected are Friday and Saturday, August 12 and 13, the big race to come on the second day. The next meeting will be opened on Saturday, September 3, and concluded on the following Monday, Labor day. The closing meeting of the year will be held on Friday and Saturday, October 7 and 8.

The reconstructed speedway is almost ready for the speed trials proposed for a week from next Friday and Saturday. At these trials it is expected that new records will be set in all distances from one to one hundred miles. Racing drivers will then know what will be required at the meets to be held next year. Among the notable cars already here for the trials are Lewis Strang's 200-horse power Fiat and the famous Christie machine.
