GIBNEY SPEEDWAY VICTIM.

Motorcycle Policeman Hurt While Practicing for Races.

Albert C. Gibney, the motorcycleman of the police department, who has caused much worry to seorching automobilists and motorcycleists, is laid up temporarily for repairs. Gibney was trying out the new speedway track yesterday afternoon, and he was running at a speed of about a mile a minute when he lost control of his machine. The man was thrown a distance of about two hundred feet, and received injuries that will keep him away from his duties for several weeks. Gibney was not driving his police machine. The cycle he was using was a racing wheel, which he intended to enter at the races this afternoon. At the time of the accident he was approaching a curve, and he attempted to oil up his machine without checking his speed, which is often done by racers. To pump the oil Gibney was required to release one of his handle bars. The machine skidded, and before Gibney could seize the handle bars with both hands to steady the machine he was thrown. He was badly lacerated by rolling on the gritty surface of the track. The injuries are exceedingly painful. Bicycleman Wilson has been transferred to the motorcycle squad at police headquarters. He and motorcycleman Stone will look after the "seorchers" during Gibney's absence.

NEW YORK, August 14.—Lewis Strang, the racing automobile driver, will pilot a car in the free-for-all events, at Indianapolis next week, which is heralded here as one of the most remarkable racing machines ever constructed.
