CORONER HOLDS THE BODY

Cliff Litterall, of Dayton, O., died at the Methodist hospital early this morning from the effects of injuries received when he was run over by an automobile in Capitol avenue Tuesday. Litterall, who was a mechanic, here for the races, was riding on the gasoline tank at the rear of a racing car and as the car turned a corner he was thrown off. The first report said the rear wheel of the same machine passed over his chest and abdomen, crushing him badly. Coroner Blackwell said today, however, that the evidence taken by him showed that Litterall was run over by another automobile following.

"To determine the cause of death," he answered. Just prior to this, Mr. Blackwell had said the evidence showed an automobile had run over Litterall.

The coroner took charge of the body immediately after the death. A. M. Raggsdale & Co., undertakers, were engaged by the family to prepare the body to be sent to Dayton for burial, but they were not able to obtain possession of the body because of the coroner's investigation and autopsy. The coroner said he would probably be able to get the body ready by tonight, though he was not sure.

Recently nearly all of the Indianapolis undertakers entered a vigorous protest against what they declare is a practice of Coroner Blackwell, who also is an undertaker, to hold dead bodies an unnecessarily long time to make investigations and his refusal to turn them over to undertakers that have been engaged by the relatives to have charge of the burial.

"I must be satisfied as to the cause of death before I release the body," said Mr. Blackwell.
