**OLDFIELD PUTS OVER TRICK
ON CONCERN THAT FIXED CAR**

**Beats Machines of Company That Enabled
Entry to Contest.**

Barney Oldfield, dare-devil—fearless—peer-
less—or any other of the hundred names ap-
plied to him by his hustling, energetic press
agents, put over one little trick yesterday,
the like of which he never before has been
the perpetrator in his motor racing career.

Barney broke a steering knuckle on his
Knox "six" racing car Friday and was un-
able to enter the events in which he was
scheduled to race. The mishap occurred at
noon before the races started.

A. C. Newby, head of the National Motor
Vehicle Company, came to Oldfield's rescue,
and Friday night his machinists turned out
a new knuckle for Oldfield's car. Then Bar-
ney did his worst.

In a five-mile event for cars of 451 to 600
cubic inches piston displacement yesterday
he drove as the sole contender with two Na-
tionals, one of them driven by Donn Herr,
formerly a mechanic, but in that race in
his maiden trip at the wheel. The other
National pilot was Aitken. Barney beat
them both, but Herr pushed him to a length
finish.

Thus the great driver rewarded the Na-
tional Company for the new part, but it's
in the game and Barney is out to win on
the square.
