

MORE RECORDS WILL GO DOWN ON FINAL DAY

Short Races in National Cham-
pionship Events Will Bring
Out Some Fast Speeders.

RECORDS DOWN SATURDAY

More records are expected to fall Mon-
day at the closing day's races at the
Speedway.

New milestones in a record way were
made Saturday at the famous auto course,
in which the most serious accident was the
breaking of a leg of Lytle, driver of the
American car.

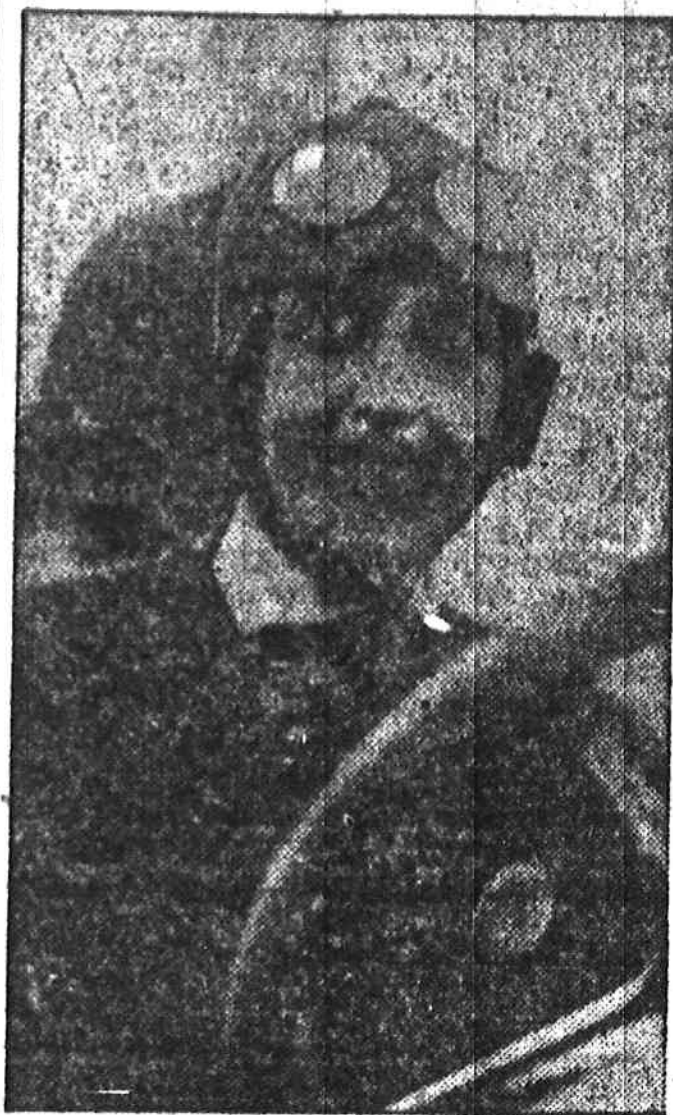
Harroun in his Marmon Wasp, posted a
new record for the 200 miles when he won
the Wheeler-Schebler trophy race, the
classic of the three days' race. Harroun's
time for the 200-mile grind was 2:46:47.47,
lowering the previous record for the same
distance, held by Chevrolet, driver of the
Buick and made at Atlanta. Chevrolet's
time was 17.47 seconds slower.

Harroun tore away auto history, as far
as records are concerned when he finished
the 150 miles in the remarkable time of
:02:16, lowering Robertson's record made
in a Flat at Atlanta 2 minutes and 43.63
seconds. Harroun's average time for the
first 150 miles was 73.62 miles an hour,
while his average time for the 200 miles
was 72.10 miles an hour.

Johnny Aftken smashed his own record,
made the day previous, when he whizzed
his National around the course for ten
miles in 8:08.03. Barney Oldfield in his
Knox "sixty" made five miles in 4:03.44,
an average gait of 73.94 miles an hour.
