# WRIGHTS MAKE NEW SPEEDWAY BARGAIN

Remove Clause Barring Aero-  
planes That May Be Infringe-  
ments on Their Patents.

## WILL ENTER FIVE MACHINES

Aviators Agree to Ship Machines  
for Outdoor Show During  
May Races.

Carl G. Fisher, president of the Aero Club of Indiana and of the Indianapolis Motor Speedway, and E. A. Moross, director of contests for the Speedway, returned from Dayton, where they were in conference with the Wright brothers relative to the contract which the Speedway entered into with the Wright brothers several weeks ago for flights at the Speedway June 13, 14, 15, 16, 17 and 18. The Speedway management desired a change in the contract which necessitated that all aviators that take part in this contest be licensed by the Speedway and agree to abide by the license rules of the Wright brothers as being infringers on their patents.

The Wright brothers permitted that this clause of the contract, which was objectionable to the Speedway management, be changed to the following agreement: "The Wright Company hereby licenses this meet and agrees to make no additional, or further charge, for any machines taking part in this meet, which may be infringements on its patents."

The Wright brothers permitted that this clause of the contract, which was objectionable to the Speedway management, be changed to the following agreement: "The Wright Company hereby licenses this meet and agrees to make no additional, or further charge, for any machines taking part in this meet, which may be infringements on its patents."

**Guarantee Wrights \$50,000.**

The contract entered into by the Speedway Company guarantees the Wright brothers \$50,000 for five more machines which they are to furnish to contest at this meet, all of which are to perform with experienced aviators. The Wright brothers also agree that this will be the first event in the United States in which they will enter their machines, and that they will have one or more machines shipped to the Speedway for the outdoor aviation show, which will be held during the Speedway automobile races, May 27, 28 and 30.

Carl G. Fisher at once cabled to France for a machine, and has requested his agent there to advise him what machines are to be purchased, immediate delivery or shipment guaranteed, his preference being for a Bleriot or Antoinette.

Joseph Curzon, owner of the record-breaking Farman, now at the Speedway, has ordered a Gnome motor from France, to put in his Farman, while the National Motor Car Company has just supplied two motors for the Fisher aeroplanes, just completed by Capt. Bumbaugh. The Motor Speedway will open with the first licensed meet ever held in the United States.
