## Triumphant Pilots at Atlanta Come to Indianapolis Speedway for Workouts.

## MOROSS TELLS OF MEETING

### Speedway Director Reviews the Southern Races and Brings Word From Drivers.

Many Indianapolis enthusiasts who attended the automobile races at the Atlanta Speedway last week returned yesterday and last night, while the drivers and mechanics who participated in the events will be home today and tomorrow. All will start preparations for the automobile races at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway, May 27, 28 and 30, and the big bricked course will be a busy scene from now until the meeting. Dashing cars and humming motors will be daily accompaniments to construction work at the Speedway.

In the returning caravan was E. A. Moross, director of contests at the Indianapolis Speedway. Mr. Moross said:

"The eyes of the motor world are on Indianapolis racing cars. The way that Indianapolis cars and drivers cleaned up with things at Atlanta was certainly a shame. **Harroun Proved Ability.**

"Harroun was a star, winning three firsts and placing in a couple of other events. When he was not winning the National and American were at the lead of the contests, and the way the Nationals flew around the track was a caution. Hard luck pursued Aitken, star of the Blue racing team. When leading in the first long event of the meet he ran off the track. Few people realize what running off the track at the Atlanta Speedway really means. Unless this is done on the home stretch, it is a drop of about thirty feet, and that is what Aitken took. How he ever escaped with his life is a mystery and another one of the lucky incidents of the Atlanta track.

"Johnny was broken-hearted when his car was out of the entire meet after the first day, and as he viewed the wreck the tears coursed down his cheeks, as he seemed to have it cinched. Harroun, the desert Bedouin, was trailing him; after that no one had a chance to overtake the Marmon. In fact, Indianapolis cars were making the race anyhow, and Harroun went through the entire 200 miles without even hesitating. It was a wonderful performance.

"Herb Lytle was a space destroyer, daring and reckless. Lytle has not won an event for a long time until Atlanta, and the way he took chances made Oldfield in his palmiest days look like a safe and sane driver. His driving brought out the American car as another of the Indianapolis products with high-powered stock class.
