E. A. Moross, director of the Speedway contests, was in Dayton, O., yesterday making plans for this aerial exhibition here. He said last night that he expects Indianapolis to have the first aerial meet ever held in America without injunction proceedings.

Wrights "Own Air."

Mr. Moross, after making a study of the legal complications involved in the actions of the Wrights against Louis Paulhan, the French aviator, stated that the Wrights "own the air." He said that at least five Wright machines of different types will be seen here, and that, if permission can be procured from them, Indianapolis-made crafts may also be given a chance to soar.

Louis Paulhan, because of the Wrights' injunction, has only two more weeks to fly in this country, and for every day he does fly he must pay the Wrights \$1,000 a day. Mr. Moross said: "According to the decision of Judge Larned Hand of the United States Supreme Court of New York the Wrights have, by virtue of the patents that have been granted them by the United States government, obtained control of the air. Judge Hand takes practically the same view as did Judge John R. Hazel of Buffalo, when he recently granted the Wrights an injunction against Glenn H. Curtiss, the American aviator."

Balloon Dates Selected.

It is also the intention of the local promoters to have an aviation meet here in the fall. Other aerial meets have been granted different cities by the contest committee of the Aero Club of America, of which Carl Fisher of this city is the president. From this list it is seen that Indianapolis has procured its share. The international balloon race goes to St. Louis, but the local men did not bid strongly for this, for the reason that there will be more entrants in the national event which they did procure.

The international aviation meet is still hanging fire because of the legal action of the Wrights, which at present makes such a meet impossible. Indianapolis still leads in bids for this meet, however, and whenever it is decided local men will be on the spot urging their claims.

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Sept. 17—National championship balloon race from Indianapolis, Ind. Twenty entries are expected. The pilots making the three best records in this race will be considered as nominees to represent the United States in the international balloon race for the Gordon-Bennett Cup. This race is only open to pilots of the Aero Club of America and to balloons of 2,200 cubic meters capacity.

The first place on the team is reserved for E. W. Mix, winner of the international race of 1909. Should Mr. Mix be unwilling to compete, the pilots who make the three best records in the national race will be chosen to represent the Aero Club of America. If Mr. Mix will compete, the two first pilots will receive places on the team.

The international balloon race will take place Oct. 17, 1910, from St. Louis.
