

INDIANAPOLIS WILL MAKE AIR HISTORY

Hoosier Capital Will Command
Attention of World When Noted
Aviators Gather.

WRIGHT CONCESSIONS BOON

Brothers Remove all Obstacles
and Will Assist to Make Event
Greatest Ever.

The fact that the aviation carnival, scheduled at the Indianapolis Speedway June 13-18, will be open to the world's "sky pilots," regardless of whether or no they have a license from the Wright Company, assures a meeting which will see the making of aeroplane history. When the Motor Speedway first contracted with the Wright brothers they gained a big concession when Orville and Wilbur and associates agreed to permit other machines to fly providing the craft from other hands were licensed under the Wright patents.

On account of the intensity of the feeling that existed between the rival aeroplane manufacturers, it was evident that the Speedway ought, if possible, to remove the barrier entirely to insure the entries of the greatest men in the rival sky conquerors. However, the Wright brothers realized that it might weaken their defense of their patents if they waived the right of injunction even once and it required the enterprise and ability of two Indianapolis men to persuade the famous aeroplane inventors to make the meet a

and with the greatest pilots at the helms. With the revised contract between the Speedway management and the Wright Company, lifting the barrier, there are now practically no limits to the possibilities of the aviation meeting in June. That it will be the greatest exhibition of aeroplane maneuvering and speeding there seems not the slightest reason to doubt.

Famous Machines Will Come.

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The generosity of the Motor Speedway management, combined with the desire of the Wrights to promote the aeroplane sport and the industry, caused them to agree to permit any and all machines and drivers to fly at the Speedway during the second week in June without even the payment of a license fee. However, this meeting at the Speedway will be the first one at which the restraining injunction rights will be waived by the famous brothers.

Only Contest of Kind.

It is highly probable that it will also be the only meet at which other than Wright machines and drivers will be allowed to participate without paying a license fee. Men who are flying now in other than Wright craft and without a license are doing so by the advance deposit of a heavy bond to cover later fines in case the injunction of the courts in favor of the Wrights is sustained in the final decision.

In other words, those who are putting on meets without the direct privilege from the owners of the patents are doing so at the risk of prosecution. Naturally the Speedway wanted to avoid any such possibility.

Moreover, in keeping with their extensive plans, the Speedway management did not want to confine its meet to any one make of machines. They were anxious to make the June aviation week the greatest in the world's history. This meant the entries of all kinds of ships

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Famous Machines Will Come.

More than a score of machines are expected to participate, including monoplanes, biplanes and triplanes. They will be of every prominent make, including Wright, Curtiss, Farman, Bleriot, Antoinette and many new creations, whose names are not yet so well established.

The original record breaking Farman biplane with so many world famous achievements to its credit; Bleriot's of established performance, and other machines which have been tried and not found wanting in rain, wind, heat and cold, will be gathered at the Speedway.

The Wright brothers have agreed to come to the Speedway some time before the June meeting and train their young drivers in the art of flying on the local grounds. They have made the Speedway management guarantee the absolute privacy of the grounds for their training purposes, however. Other aeroplanes are now housed at the Speedway and the men who will handle the craft will have plenty of time to get accustomed to the lay of the land before the great craft rise from the aviation grounds June 13.

Although the gates are closed to spectators during these practice spins, the mere fact that the world-famous birdmen are maneuvering will cast an attractive glamour around the Speedway plant and is expected to arouse greater interest in the meeting.

The Wrights have promised to make an effort to have one or two of their latest models at the Speedway for exhibition purposes during the big motor racing meet, which will officially open the magnificent plant for the season of 1910 on May 27, 28 and 30.

At a cost of more than \$95,000 the In-

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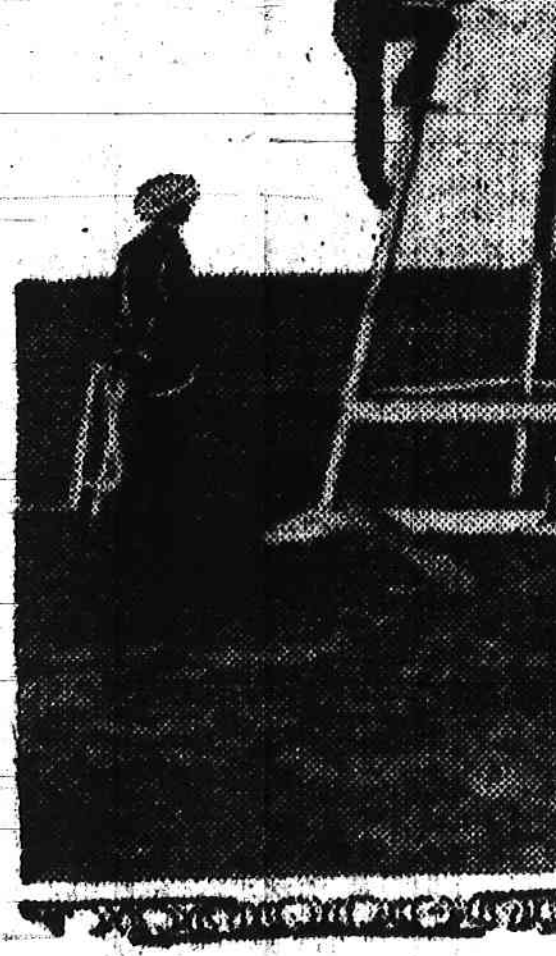
