The international aviation meet of one week, the biggest sporting event of 1910, can be obtained for the Indianapolis motor speedway, it is said, if the Indianapolis merchants will assist. The bids for the meet will be opened in St. Louis on Saturday, January 29, and prior to that time E. A. Moross, director of contests at the Indianapolis motor speedway, hopes to have the assurance of assistance of Indianapolis merchants that will practically assure the landing of the six-day event. It is stated that Indianapolis can offer by far better inducements than any other city in the United States, if the business men will do their share.

It has not been the policy of the officials of the Indianapolis motor speedway to ask the assistance of outsiders for any project to be undertaken, but the international aviation meet is of such gigantic proportions and holds such universal attention that the rule may be altered to an extent in this instance. Wonderful advancement is expected to be made in aviation prior to the international meet, which probably will be held in August, and already the aviators have shown that marvelous things can be done with the airships, and that there no longer is any doubt of the ability of man to fly with

### Guaranty is Essential.

To land the International meet for Indianapolis it will be necessary to give a guaranty of at least \$60,000, and it is proposed that Indianapolis merchants and business men aid by agreeing to buy tickets to that amount. One hundred business men taking five hundred tickets each would raise the necessary \$60,000. The holders of these tickets could dispose of them in any manner desired. In addition, it is proposed that Indianapolis business men purchase \$25,000 in bonds, and that this sum be offered in prizes for various aerial performances, the fastest mile, the longest and farthest flights, etc. These bonds would be taken up by the speedway with the first money cleared on the project. In this manner it is hoped to land an Indianapolis bid of \$25,000 in prizes and \$60,000 as a guarantee, with the privilege of 60 per cent. of the gate receipts.

It is believed the total attendance at the speedway would make the meet successful from a financial standpoint, and if the plan proposed is followed the only assistance to be given the speedway would be the purchase of tickets. It is said that New York would gladly give \$400,000 for the meet and that other cities larger than Indianapolis would give an equal sum to land the event. New York could not get it at any price, however, on account of the proximity of the ocean and the same reason bars many other big cities. An inland city is absolutely necessary.

### Speedway Ideal Place.

The Indianapolis motor speedway, with a seating capacity for twenty-five thousand spectators and the biggest aerodrome in the country, is the ideal place for holding such a meet. The big attendance at the balloon races in this city last spring showed that the interest in aeronautics is at a high pitch and airships form a much greater attraction than balloons.

The international aviation meet will be preceded by a national meet in the city that lands the big event, and the machines making the best performances will later be entered in contests with the best machines of Europe, selected after qualifying contests in their own countries.

Officials of the motor speedway will hold a meeting tonight at the office of Carl C. Fisher, at which the situation will be thoroughly canvassed. If it is proposed finally to ask the aid of the Indianapolis merchants a meeting with members of the Merchants' Association and Commercial Club will be arranged at once. It is the desire to be in readiness to present a bid at the St. Louis meeting of the Federated Aero Clubs January 29 that will be taken seriously.
