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INDIANAPOLIS IN LEAD FOR AVIATION MEET

OPINION OF REPRESENTATIVES
AT ST. LOUIS MEETING.

DATE FOR BIDS EXTENDED

Indianapolis has the best chance to land the international aviation meet, the biggest sporting event of 1910, in the opinion of C. G. Fisher and E. A. Moross, of the Indianapolis motor speedway. They returned yesterday from St. Louis, where they attended a meeting of the Federated Aero Clubs of America, at which bids for the big event were submitted. Ten aero clubs were represented, but only three bids were made for the international aviation meet. It was voted by the federation to open the bids and extend the time to April 1, when a decision will be made by the Aero Club of America in New York. The other cities bidding for the international meet are Washington and St. Louis.

Representing the Indianapolis motor speedway, Carl Fisher submitted a bid Saturday of 50 per cent. of the gate receipts, supported by a guarantee of \$50,000 in cash and \$25,000 in cash for prizes. When the time for receiving bids was extended the Indianapolis bid was withdrawn. It will again be submitted, however. The international aviation meet will be of four days instead of six or ten, as was at first thought. There will be three aviation meetings in the United

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Fisher Member of Contest Board.

Carl G. Fisher, of Indianapolis; Allen R. Hawley, of New York, and A. B. Lambert, of St. Louis, were appointed members of a contest board. They will draft a schedule of balloon and aviation events for the various cities of the country. In the event that Indianapolis does not land the international aviation meet it is certain that one of the other meets will be awarded to this city, but the local promoters will be satisfied with nothing but the international event.

The Indianapolis bid at St. Louis was the only one submitted in which a definite figure was stated and it seemed to be the general impression, according to Mr. Moross, that Indianapolis has the inside track. It is the intention of the local promoters to keep in close touch with the situation and leave nothing undone to obtain the big meet.
