## AEROPLANE RAGES: ARE CALLED OFF

Event Arranged by Motor Speedway is Postponed Because of Curtiss's Demands.

ASKS \$12,000, FLY OR NOT

His Coming Flights at St. Louis, Recent Stipulation, Not Agreeable to Managers.

The aeroplane and balloon carnival which was scheduled to be held at the Indianapolis Motor Speedwdy Oct. 14, 16 and 16 has been called off. This action was taken yesterday morning by the Speedway managers, who refused to pay what the bird men asked, and because Glenn H. Curtiss, the famous Rheims victor, changed his contract twice, each time raising the price.

While Curtiss was in France E. A. Moross of the Speedway cabled him and got his consent to fly in Indianapolis this month, Curtiss agreeing not to appear anywhere west of New York before the local races. Later he asked permission to appear at St. Louis six days before the local event. The St. Louis race is to be held in a public park, and owing to the great liability that Curtiss would run, endangering his life and machine, the Speedway promoters decided that they could not afford to announce a meet so soon afterward.
