He is the son of John E. Tapping, a former old settler of Indianapolis, who died last April at the age of 81. Henry Tapping is a cabinet maker and succeeded his father in the office of superintendent of the Indianapolis Cabinet Makers' Union.

The Tapping home has been standing for nearly sixty years and when built was at the eastern extremity of the city.

Mr. Tapping is not a lover of sport or amusements of any sort and had no thought of attending the races at the Speedway until persuaded to do so by his sister Sophia. He did not leave the house until nearly 8 o'clock, and, it is believed, did not see a race before the accident occurred.

The first news of the accident to their brother was received by the sisters about 5:30 o'clock. Sophia Tapping was sweeping the front sidewalk and at first refused to believe it was her brother who was injured. She received the news in a cool manner. Saying that she had never used a telephone, she asked the informant to call the hospital and learn the extent of her brother's injuries.
