for one mile to lower Speedway record. The following are the cars and the time made:

American car, Driver Lytle, one mile in 46:05; National No. 60, Driver Kincaid, 46:52; National No. 70, Driver Aitken, 44:46; Fiat, No. 99, Driver Bragg, 39:50; Marmon, No. 6, Driver Harroun, 41:05; Darracq, Driver Kirscher, 43:38. Track record, 39.

The fourth event followed the first instead of taking the order scheduled. This was for cars of 1,700 pounds and above, 221 to 300 cubic inches displacement. The prizes were \$100 in gold for first place and \$50 in silver for second.

Harroun and Dawson, both in Marmon "32's," tied for first and second; time for ten miles, 8 minutes, 16.8 seconds. Fox, in a Pope-Hartford car, was third. Sheffler, driving a Jackson car, took fourth place.

Five-Mile Record Broken.

Event No. 5, a five-mile race for prizes, made the prettiest race up to that time. The Jackson car, driven by Lynch, dropped out. This left three National cars, driven by Aitken, Kincaid and Merz, and two Marmon cars in the race. They hung bunched throughout the trial and at the finish there was not 40 feet between the first and the fifth car.

However, Kincaid, driving a National, pushed the nose of his car over the line about 18 inches ahead of the second car, a Marmon, driven by Dawson. The prize was \$100 in gold to the winner and \$50 in silver for the second man. The time was 4:57.6, which lowers the record for five miles by 40 seconds.

REVENUE CRIME CHARGED.

Deputy United States Marshal Rankin, Thursday, arrested Charles Cutsinger at Shelbyville, Ind., charged with alleged violation of the internal revenue law.
