FIVE HUNDRED MACHINES EXPECTED TO BE IN LINE.

DECORATIONS PUT UP EARLY

One of the big features of the national convention of motorcyclists this week will be parade Thursday afternoon, starting at 1:30 from the Circle. Five hundred machines are expected to be in line and every rider in the city, state and nation invited to participate. The route has been arranged, but it will lay through the principal business streets of the Indianapolis will be at Riverdale throughout the day and state and midwest the interest in the motorcycle to be held at the speedway, four miles west of the city, next Friday and Saturday, is at a high pitch and the indications are that great crowds will be attendance on both days.
