# SPEEDWAY WILL BE PAVED WITH BRICK

## Army of Laborers Will Begin Work Today on New Surface for Racing Course.

### ASSOCIATION TO USE EXPERTS

## National Organization of Manu- facturers Interested in Tests for Perfect Roadway.

An army of workmen will begin today to cover the entire surface of the two-and-one-half-mile race track at the Speedway with vitrified brick. More than 3,500,000 bricks will be used, with thousands of barrels of cement, costing \$30,000. The total cost of the entire improvements now under way at the Speedway will exceed \$180,000, making the giant course represent an investment of a little less than \$700,000.

The work will be rushed with all the speed possible, and the fall races will be held on a brick surface, enabling the auto drivers to send their machines around the course at positively full speed.

Twenty-five car loads of brick arrived at the Speedway yesterday from the Wabash Clay Factory of Veedersburg, which firm was successful in landing the big contract. At the rate of twenty cars a day they will arrive until the shipment is completed at the end of the month. The Veedersburg plant has increased its working force with 200 men to get the brick here on scheduled time.

P. T. Andrews, engineer of the track, will superintend the work, which will likely be let out to three or four contractors.

**Old Bed Is Foundation.**

The present composition of the track, which was thought to be hard enough to stand the greatest wear and tear of the racers, will serve as a base for the new surface. It will be rolled hard and smooth and covered over with several inches of sand, making the new surface about ten inches higher than formerly. The weather will have no effect on the pavement, and races during a rain, will be as good as on clear days.

This, of course, will be the only race course in the world constructed with paving brick and will be an experiment which will be watched by heads of municipalities, since there is a great question as to what pavements can best endure the rough usage of automobiles. In view of this, the United Brick Association of America, which meets here next week, will delegate six experts to assist Mr. Andrews in superintending the work. These men will remain here until the work is done and will see that no flaw is left in its construction.

The grade of the track on the straight- ways and turns will not be changed other than generally raised the thickness of the brick and sand base. The last race proved that the bankings at the end were perfect.

Other extensive improvements are under way. The new aerodrome within the track in the southeast corner is now practically completed. It has capacity for two dirigible balloons or four or five aeroplanes. The structure has been painted and is complete with the excep- tion of hanging the huge doors.

**Making New Bleachers.**

A new section of bleachers on the south side of the track to the west of the present bleachers will double the seating capacity to the 50-cent sections. An ad- ditional tier of box seats in front of the present grand stand will greatly increase the capacity. Besides these another new grand stand on the west side of the track and north of the present amphithe- ater will be constructed. It will seat sev- eral thousand people. The directors say that at the next races there will be no occasion for spectators to stand around the edge of the track and all possibility of accidents to the spectators will be obliterated.

When the new surface is completed, the present record for a mile, 43 7-10 seconds, held by the famous driver, Barney Old- field, has little chance of surviving.

The winding course which is being built within the present track will be of the original construction, since it is meant to correspond with a country road and will be used for endurance tests rather than
