CHRISTIE PRAISES COURSE

Believes That He Will Break All Records Up to Twenty-Five Miles.

Director of Contests E. A. Moross received the first entry to the record trials to be held at the Motor Speedway Dec. 17 and 18 yesterday. The Marmon, which has been creating a sensation since it entered the racing game, was the firts to apply for entrance into the record trials and all of the performances in the past bid fair to make this entry a formidable one.

A Cole "Thirty" was the second car to get into the fold, and although a new machine in the racing game, with the exception of a few events in the last few months, this car will make some of the others hustle to hold the records for events in its class.
