SPEEDWAY TRIALS WILL START TODAY

Strang, Christie, Kincaid and Aitken Will Drive Racers in the First Events.

GOVERNOR DEDICATES TRACK

State's Chief Executive Will Take Part in Bricklaying Ceremonies This Afternoon.

With the forecast for fair weather today and with the new brick track in the finest possible shape the Indianapolis Motor Speedway is ready for its first record trials today. As a forerunner of what they expect to do today Strang, Stillman and Aitken fairly burned up the race course yesterday, Strang, in his hig Fiat turning a half mile in 162-5 seconds; Altken in a National 40 making the two and one-half-mile lap in 1:59, and Stillman in a Marmon covering the circuit in 2:01. Following his workout yesterday Strang asserted that the new brick track is the fastest he has ever seen.

The speed trials will begin this afterhoon following the ceremonies attending the laying of the gold brick, in which Governor Marshall, honorary referes of

the meeting, will take part.

The first event will be open to all cars which have complied with the racing rules and there will be no restrictions as to piston placement, weight or price. The cars will be sent away with a flying start and will try for all records, from one-quarter of a mile to ten miles.

Strang in First Event.

Strang will drive his 200-horse-power Flat, Christie his freak racer and Aitken and Kincaid will drive Nationals in this event. Each car will be permitted to make two attempts in the record trials up to and including one mile. The second event will be free for all trials up to one irings on the clear winter air with a tremile under the same conditions and with the same cars and drivers as in event No. 1, except that the cars will be sent away from a standing start. Three Nationals and a Packard will take part in event No. 3 for cars of class No. 1 with a piston displacement of 451 to 600 cubic inches. The trials are for distances from a quarter mile to 100 mHes, and in all the remaining trials the cars will get away with a flying start. The other events on the program for tomorrow are all for the same distance—from a quarter of a mile to 100 miles.

In event No. 4, for cars of class No. 2, with a piston displacement of 301 to 450 cubic inches, Kincaid and Aitken will drive Nationals and Stillman will drive a Marmon. Ray Harroun will drive a Mar-mon and a Stoddard-Dayton will be entered by Carl G. Fisher in the event for cars of class No. 3, with a 281 to 300 cubic inches piston displacement. In the sixth event, for cars with a piston displacement of 161 to 280 cubic inches, Louis Sweitzer will drive a Fuller and Endicott will drive The Empire, driven by Newell Motsinger, will be the only car to make the trial for cars of class No. 5, with a

piston displacement under 160 cubic inches.
