F. S. FISH SAYS MORGAN COMPANY ACTED ONLY FOR SOUTH BEND FIRM'S INTEREST IN E-M-F CONTROL

SOUTH BEND, Ind., (Special)—The Studebaker interests in South Bend now control the mobile Company of Detroit and Studebaker Vehicle Company of New York. The statement made by Morgan & Co. of New York that the Company acted only for the interests in the automobile deals is correct. The following statement made by Frederick S. Fish, president of the Studebaker Brothers Manufacturing Company, this afternoon, explains the deal mean for South Bend. "That deal was asked Mr. Fish. 'That deal is not itself,' said Mr. Fish. 'I am going out from South Bend, E-M-F Company is incorporated under the laws of the state of Michigan and business directly connected with the sales will be transacted in Michigan.'
