As far as that is concerned all of the entrants will be warned and the strictest supervision will be made. The efficials are confident that the race can be fun in safety with the proper precautions and

"Bob" Burman, the world's speed king, who traveled 142 miles an hour at Daytona last month, and who will drive a Benz in the big race at Indianapolis, leaves tomorrow for the West. The Benz cars will arrive in Indianapolis next Weducaday, and, after a dying visit to his Michigan home, Bob will be at the track by the time file cars are there.
