


# Monarch to Pilot Car in Speedway R

Dillon's eye was cut slightly, but it did not bother him in the least. Dillon sailed in with a series of quick short blows without a return from Moha. The men were careful, although going at full speed. The round was even. Hisses from the gallery were followed by a storm of applause for the fighters.

Round 5—Moha jabbed with his left and Dillon uppercut twice in succession. Moha landed on his stomach and followed with lefts on Dillon's elbow. The Hoosier's blocking being a feature, Dillon landed a right to the stomach and then grazed Moha's nose with an overhand swing. Moha poked through Dillon's defense with a left jab to the stomach. He uppercut Dillon, but Jack came back with a right jab, which staggered Moha. Moha broke ground when Dillon swung wildly, landing several stinging rights and lefts.

Round 6—They exchanged wallops at close quarters. Moha landed on Dillon's stomach. He followed with a right uppercut, but Dillon penetrated Moha's defense with a similar swing. They exchanged hard wallops, both men playing for the body. Several of Moha's blows appeared to be a trifle low, but the Hoosier never murmured. Moha hammered Dillon's kidneys and poked a stinging jab over Dillon's head as they broke away from a clinch. Dillon swung to Moha's jaw. Moha met him with a series of short, dangerous blows and landed several stinging wallops on Dillon's chin and shoulders. Moha played for Dillon's stomach. Dillon led with his right to Moha's face. ## "WILD BOB" NAMED TO DRIVE BIG BENZ

Burman Will Pilot Monster German Car in 500-Mile Race Memorial Day.

## MOROSS ENTERS TWO TEUTONS

Promoter Buys Newly Imported Speed Creations to Contest in Speedway Event.

"Wild Bob" Burman, world's speed king, the man who has driven a motor car faster than any other human being ever dared, will pit his daring and skill against a field of forty-five other starters in the 500-mile International Sweepstakes race at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway next Memorial day, May 30. This announcement was made by the management of the Speedway last night upon telegraphic advice from New York that J. A. Moross, Burman's manager, had made good his promise to bring the motor monarch to Indianapolis for the long grind. "Wild Bob" will be seen at the wheel of a newly imported Benz car, which is one of two entered by Moross. The driver of the other Benz has not been named.

Moross closed the deal for the two cars, and immediately gave in the entry of both. They are the same creations of the German factory which won many victories in Europe and were sent here upon the solicitation of Jesse Froelich, managing director of the Benz Import Company of New York. The big Teuton motor has 421 inch displacement and are of the two-mile-a-minute type for which the Benz factory has been noted. The American promoter cornered the importation of this type of car as soon as the machines had reached this country and they will make their first American appearance in the Indianapolis race. They will be shipped on to Indianapolis at once and Burman and his teammate will start tuning the monster motors for the contest on Memorial day.

### BREAKS ALL ENTRY MARKS.

The entries for the long race are closed and Moross got in just under the wire along with the Simplex Motor Car Company of Milwaukee, Ind., which entered a second Amplex car to be driven by Walter Jones. This brings the total list of cars to start in the 500-mile race up to forty-six, twenty more than the greatest number ever before entered in one event in the history of automobile racing. The giant Benz cars which Burman and his fellow pilot will drive through the 500-mile grind, are said by the foreign makers to be the fastest cars of their size ever constructed. For more than a year the skilled German mechanics worked on these masterpieces, and with all of the care and cunning which these Teutons have, they made motors which have proved their capabilities in many astounding performances abroad. This is the first appearance of the cars outside of the European continent where they have been conquerors of every competitor.

The Indianapolis race will be the first appearance of "Wild Bob" at the wheel since he made his time-annihilating flights across the wave-washed sands of the Florida beach, and shattered the world's record for the kilometer, the mile and the two-mile distances. This Michigan boy, 27-year-old, took the same car in which Barney Oldfield made his records, and set the world again by opening the throttle as far as it would go and setting the work of the former speed king at naught.
