## MAKERS PROTEST BURMAN

Manufacturers Entered in Speed-  
way Event Object to "Speed  
King's" Record Trials.

Harry Endicott, a brother of "Farmer Bill" Endicott, was named yesterday as the driver of the Interstate "Bull Dog" instead of C. B. Baldwin by the Muncie company for their entry in the 500-mile race at the Speedway one week from today.

Endicott had been named as relief driver some time ago and Baldwin, who had done most of his driving on dirt tracks, was named as pilot. The change in drivers was a surprise to the entrants now here and the Speedway management. It may be said that Endicott will have the advantage of Baldwin, having driven in all the meetings on the Speedway last year and being familiar with the track, while Baldwin was going to drive his first race here. Endicott for a time last season was on the Cole team with his brother and drove in the events at Fairmount Park in October. Harry came in with his car yesterday and but for the rain would have been out practicing on the track.

The Speedway management last night confirmed the rumor that a number of the manufacturers who have entered cars in the 500-mile race had protested. Bob Burman, driving the "Hiltzen" Benz, one hour before the race to establish world's records for Speedways and specially built tracks. The Speedway management refused to state what its final action would be, but the protest will be decided this week.

## Jack Morgan Goes Down Twice in Eighth Round, Then Appeals to Referee in Next Inning.

Jack Morgan turned two appealing eyes on Referee Tommy Dillon in the ninth round of his scheduled ten-round bout with Paddy Lavin at the Empire last night, and kind-hearted Tommy made the fighter put on their clothes—that is, their boxing clothes—and the big bunch of fight fans, who turned out to see the Buffalo boy "debut," dispersed.

Lavin's popularity in Indianapolis is due to the fact that he pecked Jack to pieces during the major part of the go, jabbed the Buffalo boy at will, taking, in the meantime, several of Morgan's haymarkers upon the most vulnerable parts of his anatomy, which discomfited the Irishman but little. In the eighth round Morgan landed a stiff right to Jack's jaw, and the Buffalo boy rocked on his heels for just a fraction of a second. In the second Lavin started his boxing tactics, and aside from stopping Jack a few times, had Jack secured for a quick defeat, although Jack put up a great battle until the unenviable eighth. The bell saved Morgan in the eighth round.

After Morgan tasted rosin, the first time taking the count of nine and the second time being on the carpet when the bell tolled the end of the eighth slambang round. A right-hand blow to the head sent Morgan's downfall and after he staggered groggily to his feet Lavin sent him a vicious left to the chin and a swing to the jaw. After that last blow Lavin stepped back to his corner, hoping to see his opponent counted out. Jack got up wobbly after the bell rang and clung to the ropes while his seconds led him into his corner for the last time.

### MORGAN'S FACE SWOLLEN.

The ninth Lavin's tattoo of tough tape on his nose, to the jaw and to the face, left Morgan's face in a sorry condition. Several lightning jabs found a resting place upon Jack's poor, swollen nose and landed a slight gash over his left eye. A hard right which caused the referee to flow so profusely in this round Jack appealed to Dillon to bring the fight to a close.

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### EDWARDS EXAMINES CARS.

While accidents may not have happened, the water on the track would have made it foolhardy to attempt work, and most of the drivers spent the day working on their cars, getting them in shape for the time trials Friday and the race Memorial day.
