# ZIENGAL MAKES A RECORD TRIAL SPIN

Covers Outer Track at Speedway in 2:02 in His Chadwick Six.

OTHER RACERS SHOW SPEED

Hundreds of People Watch Famous Drivers Go Through Preliminary Workouts.

Ziengal hurled a Great Chadwick Six around the lightning fast course of the Indianapolis Motor Speedway yesterday morning in the startling time of 2:02 for the two and one-half miles of the outer circuit, or an average of 73.74 miles per hour. This was but one of many sensational flights which marked the first mad trial flights over the world's greatest motor racing course.

Hundreds of people went to the Speedway yesterday when they heard the highpowered machines, the vanguard of the entries in the opening meet at the new course next Thursday, Friday and Saturday, would unleash the mighty power of those gasoline monsters in the first real trials over the new course. Time and again the crowd arose cheering as the speed demons swept around the broad turns and ate up the roadway at an inconceivable clip.

Johnny Aitken, driving his green National Six, covered the two and one-half miles in 2:05, while Barney Oldfield recled off the distance in 2:15 in his National Old Glory, without opening up the throttle to the limit. Oldfield will probably not get on the track with his big Benz until Thursday. In the Speedway carnival the latter part of the week he will drive the National in the stock car event and the Benz in the free-for-alis.
