Aitken Wins Every Race--Indians Gain on ^{the Clymers}

RISKS LIFE IN DASH TO WIN HONOR

Finishes With Broken Steering Arm After Rickenbacher's Car Is Wrecked.

WINNER TAKES \$4,600

HAPPY JOHNNY AITKEN is the name they gave him and it describes the winning Peugeot driver in yesterday's three races as nothing else can.

The Indianapolis boy tonight is living up to his name, for he won all three throws in the game of chance on the Indianapolis Motor Speedway when he finished first in each of the three races—the twenty-five, the fifty-mile, and the championship 100-mile event. He won the short event in 12:37.35, an average speed of 95.08 miles an hour; the fifty-mile in 32:49.53; an average of 91.83; and the 100-mile in 1:05:04, an average of 89.44.

Wilcox was second in the first dash; Hughes second in the fifty-mile as well as in the championship event.

INJURED RACE DRIVER SEES AITKEN WIN THREE EVENTS

Out of the hospital for the first time since last May, where he was taken after having his leg broken in a bad spill in the Decoration day 300-mile race on the local Speedway, Tom Rooney sat in a touring car with his nurse, directly behind John Aitken's pit, and saw his teammate win all three events at the Speedway yesterday. Rooney was driving a Premier, more than three months ago when he turned turtle and broke his left leg. He recently was allowed to hobble around on crutches. The lower picture was taken directly after the race and shows the broken steering knuckle on Aitken's Peugeot. He drove almost four laps with the car in this condition and took grave chances. His nerve was rewarded, for he won the 100-mile event, which gave him three victories in three starts.

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Aitken exhibited the same wonderful driving skill as in the 300-mile Continental race which he won last Monday, besides showing a wonderful nerve. He risked his own life and the life of Maurice Becker, his mechanic, in the big race when he drove eight miles with a broken steering arm just to finish first after Eddie Rickenbacher went out when both rear wheels gave way turning into the home stretch.

Races Full of Thrills.

From a spectator's standpoint the three races were full of thrills. As a spectacular exhibit it was the best race meet ever held on the big brick race course.

These drivers, in as many different events, tried to down Aitken, and failed. In the twenty-mile, Howard Wilcox, in his Premier pushed the winner from start to finish. Howard held the lead for about six miles and then Aitken rushed past and was never headed. He passed the champion post averaging almost ninety miles an hour and finished in 12:37.35, just 2-10 of a second ahead of Howdy Hughes. In the second race, Hughes, in a Buick Special, was the real con-


EVANS WINS GOLF TITLE; DEFEATS GARDNER

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tender. Wilcox got away in the lead and held it for more than ten miles with Aitken second and Hughes fourth. Wilcox made two tire changes and lost his place to Aitken. Hughes taking second place. The Englishman showed some speed and for a single mile in the 42-second lap led Aitken. Johnny stepped on it in the back stretch and passed his opponent, who hung doggedly on for the balance of the race.

Wins by a Fraction.

On the last lap Hughes took the entire two-and-one-half-miles with the throttle wide open and his car wracking itself at every revolution of the wheels. He gave Aitken the race of his life down the stretch and the electrical timing device caught them just 2-100 of a second apart. Only four feet separated them as the wheels of Aitken's Peugeot crossed the tape the last time.

The 100-mile race was a battle royal between Aitken and Rickenbacher for the first lap until the ninety-second mile. Aitken had the race won from the beginning, but he broke a steering arm and was ready to retreat when Rickenbacher lost both rear wheels and went out of the race with victory within his grasp. Aitken's misfortune slowed the time of the big race and the average was \$9.44. But for the break in his steering apparatus and the accident to Rickenbacher the time would have been well over the 90-mile mark.

Aitken Wins \$4,600.

By his three victories Aitken won \$4,600, which, added to the \$19,000 he captured at Cincinnati on Monday, gives him a grand total of \$23,600 for two afternoon's work. His week's work consisted in winning one 300-mile race, one 100-mile race, one fifty-mile race and a twenty-mile event and adding making his total in the A. A. A. Championship.

Rickenbacher Warned.

Aitken noticed the break and slowed down, but did not stop, for he had seen the right rear wheel on Rickenbacher's car wobble. Rick was warned by his pitman to stop, but he heeded them not. Nothing but a spill could halt either man with victory only a few laps away. Rickenbacher drove like a maniac down the back stretch and passed Aitken as though he was riding air.

Fastest on the Track.

With his car in condition, Aitken had nothing to fear. It was the fastest think on the track and he had the six race alibi in his pocket at any stake, barring accidents. He played with his opponent in the stretches, allowing him to pass him on the curves and then walking away in the straightaways as an ocean liner would pass a skiff.

How They Finished.

In the twenty-mile event Aitken, in a Peugeot, won in 12:27.55, averaging 55.93; Wilcox finished second in a Premier in 13:27.55, averaging 55.93; Arthur Chevrolet in a Sunbeam was third, in 13:15, averaging 56.21, and Hughie Hughes in a Hoakins Special was fourth in 11:36.90, averaging 58.44.
