He feels also that he can control the Toledo vote, held by Roger Braun, and is hoping he will be able to swing O. H. Walben of Louisville into line.

The next annual meeting of the American Association is expected for Indianapolis early in December. Of course a lot of things can happen in the meantime to change the political situation, but it appears now that though Mr. Chivington would not be re-elected and as though his successor would be Tom Hickey, although Lloyd Rickart, now secretary of the Toledo club, also was a candidate for the position.

His Mercedes, which he drove in the Cincinnati race, is in such condition that it will be impossible to repair it in time for the races here. Ralph entered under his own name, declaring that he would get a car. He has kept his word. If reports received at the Speedway office yesterday are correct, although he has not named the car, he will drive, reports which are believed true say that he will appear at the wheel of the blue Peugeot which Ralph Mulford intended to pilot before he was called West. This Peugeot is said to be the fastest car of its kind on this side of the water and with DePalma at the wheel should be a real contender. It is known to be much faster than the Mercedes which Ralph drove at Cincinnati and with which he ran Resta into the pits for repairs.

**Great Field of Drivers.**  
The official entry list, which will be found in other columns of The Star, gives the names of each of the twenty cars and drivers. Every good car which has appeared in races this season and every good driver is named with the exception of Resta, Mulford and Anderson. Resta, in a telegram, states that his car is not in condition to run. Anderson is out of it, of course, because of injuries.

The Indianapolis cars need little work to put them into condition. Aitken, who unloaded here yesterday morning, says that his Peugeot is in the best of condition. There is just one repair needed. One of the piston rings is chipped and a new one will have to be placed. When this is accomplished, his car will be ready for the track and he hopes to be out on the brick course today.

Joe's Chalmers is here with his car, but he has no driver for the second machine. After the Cincinnati race certain happenings made it impossible for Frank Galvin to continue as a Sunbeam pilot and another race will be seen at the wheel.
