Old dealers since the last show week are in new and more commodious quarters, and it will be the endeavor of each and every one to get away with a rush. Ample funds are at hand to make the show a success.

#### Chicago to Outshine New York.

Chicago's ninth annual automobile show, under the auspices of the National Association of Automobile Manufacturers, which takes place at the Collseum and the First Regiment armory from February 5 to 12. Manager Samuel A. Miles promises, will be the most magnificent exhibition of the kind ever held in America, despite the claims of rival press agents of the two New York shows.

As usual, the Chicago show will be national in scope and will be the only exhibition to be held in America this season in which manufacturers of licensed and independent cars will display their products under the same roof.

Miles reports he has assigned spaces to 250 manufacturers of motorcars, motorcycles, parts and accessories for the coming show. The list of motorcar exhibitors includes the names of some new firms which have come into the limelight since the last exhibition. In order to accommodate more carmakers this year it was found necessary to limit the spaces. In all, ninety-five automobile manufacturers have been given spaces on the main floor of the Coliseum and the Annex, the basement of the Annex and the main floor of the First Regiment armory.

The motorcycle department again will be an interesting feature. Spaces have been assigned to twelve makers of the two-wheelers on the second floor of the Annex. The parts and accessories firms have been taken care of in the galleries of the Collseum and the First Regiment armory.
